She has been working in the development sector for over 14 year and presently working as a Research Fellow at Institute of Social Studies Trust (ISST) and has been leading and been part of several research projects in South Asia around women's informal labour, domestic work, unpaid care work, the gig economy, etc. She has also been at the forefront for developing and running an online course on gender transformative evaluations at ISST.

Ashmeet Kaur Bilkhu is working with Institute of Social Studies Trust under the project-'Creating Momentum for Gender Transformative Programming and Advancing Gender.' Her work is focused on looking at livelihood challenges faced by women through research. She is interested in understanding and unpacking social and cultural peculiarities of violence against women.

Balwant Singh Mehta is Fellow at Institute for Human Development (Delhi) with Ph.D. in Development Economics from Jamia Milia Islamia and Post Doctoral Fellow from ICSSR. He has worked extensively in the areas of Information and Communication technology for development, labour, employment and child well being. He has contributed several papers on these themes to various reputed National & International journals and books. His contributions to social research is acknowledged by several international organizations through fellowships and other awards such as the International Amy Mahan Fellowship in ICT4D (2010-11), by University of Pompeu Fabra, Barcelona; South Asian ICT4D Research Fellowship (2009-10) from Singapore Internet Research Centre, Nanyang Technological University, Singapore; and the International Development Research Centre India Social Science Young Research Award (IDRC-SSRA) in 2009.

She is involved in the SuPWR research around women's movements in India to understand the shifting nature of feminist politics. Also involved in a 'Curriculum Building' project on Women and Work, that involves creating an online perspective building course on the discourse of women and work for development sector professionals in India. Further, also beginning a research study on 'Understanding Pastoral women and work' to open up questions of work in pastoral women's lives.

Monika Banerjee has been working with the Institute of Social Studies Trust, New Delhi in the capacity of a Research Fellow since the year 2018. Since joining, her research work has

specifically focused on bringing the issue of women's unpaid care work in the realm of policy discourses. She has also been leading and coordinating an extensive project on development of a comprehensive curriculum around 'women and work' which uses research evidence from the ground to understand the trajectory of women's work in the larger discourse of economy. The first iteration of this curriculum is scheduled for September 2021. Prior to joining ISST, Monika worked in the development sector in India as well as in UK. She holds a PhD and a M.Phil degree in Sociology of Education from the Zakir Husain Centre for Educational Studies, JNU and a Masters' in Social Work from TISS, Mumbai. Monika's interest lies in issues of governance, understanding social policy processes in a comparative framework, visibility of deprived and marginalised groups in existing policies and viability of such policies in bringing change.
